Treble Clef [Bass Clef, Musical Note] and Scrolled Heart

smithing directions by Ray Plank and pictures by Susan Plank on October 22, 2017 pages 9 through 12

Election season is upon us again, and we are faced with the burning question of "What do we do with all the election signs when it's over?" The ones shaped like a huge staple that the plastic signs slip over work very nicely for some small trinkets like a treble clef and scrolled heart.

Treble Clef -

Taper the end of the wire down to a point.



Then scroll it up about $1\frac{1}{2}$ turns with your scrolling pliers.





Once the main scroll is finished and flat, heat the wire about $1\frac{1}{2}$ " above it and while holding it there with the scrolling pliers bend it to the left and back behind the big scroll.






Cut off the the wire about ½" below main scroll.



Safety reminder: Pick up the HOT cut off piece with your tongs!



Treble Clef directions - Continued

Taper it to a point and scroll it into a hook to the left.







Make sure it is flat.



Wire brush and brass brush the Treble Clef. Then apply beeswax.







These can be made in several sizes, from 3" for a necklace to 5" or 6" for a wall hanging.

Scrolled Heart directions

Scrolled Heart -

Taper the end of the wire down to a point.



Scroll it around about 1½ turns.






Then after a short straight section, bend it at a 90° angle.





Make sure it is straight and flat. Then cut off [using hardy cutter or bolt cutter].









Taper it to a point.







Scroll it towards the first scroll until the top touches it. Make sure it is flat.





Apply bees wax. These make a very nice necklace, especially on leather lacing.






The smallest I can get is a $2" \times 1\frac{1}{2}"$, but they can be made larger.

Recipes from Susan Plank that some of ya'll asked for at our SVBG picnic -

Settler's Beans [BGCM member David Tyner's grandmother's recipe given to Susan Plank 5/2014]

1/2 pound bacon cooked and diced - reserve some of the bacon fat to cook the ground beef and onion in

1/2 pound ground beef 85% or higher cooked (we prefer 1 pound of 93% ground beef)

1 large onion diced and cooked with beef

2 cans butter beans dumped and rinsed

1 can kidney beans dumped and rinsed

1 can pork and beans dumped and partly rinsed (I like the extra juice, so I don't dump or rinse this can)

1/3 cup dark brown sugar

1/2 cup white sugar

14 cup ketchup

2 T molasses

1/2 t dry mustard

Cook bacon; cool and dice. Pour out most of bacon fat. Cook beef in bacon grease with diced onion. Put other ingredients in crock pot, then add cooked bacon, beef and onions. Simmer for 4 to 6 hours. (I have found that I can cook the bacon, beef and onion a few days early and freeze. The night before I mix all of the ingredients together and store in a sealed container in the fridge. In the morning I put the mixture in crock pot.)

Raina's seven layer dip

[SVBG member, Raina Kremer, gave this recipe to Susan Plank 6/2011]

1 pound 93% hamburger

1 pack Taco seasoning mix

1 large can refried beans

16 ounces of sour cream

1 bottle Taco Sauce - medium (we prefer hot cayenne Salsa instead of Taco Sauce)

16 oz Tex-Mex shredded cheese

1 large diced tomato

3 - 4 diced green onions

1 bag Tostitos chips

Cook the hamburger; add 1/4 cup water and taco seasoning and let simmer until somewhat thick. While the hamburger and taco seasoning is simmering, spread the refried beans in a 9" x 11" pan. Layer the seasoned hamburger on top of the refried beans. Smooth sour cream over the meat. Dribble the Taco Sauce or Salsa over the sour cream. Hand sprinkle cheese over the sour cream. Drop tomatoes on top of the cheese. Drop green onions on top of tomatoes. Cover this and put in the fridge. Raina's Seven Layer Dip can be made a day ahead. Serve cold with Tostitos chips.
